- **Johnson Institute Scholars Program** consists of three-day professional development conferences for middle and high school teachers teaching history, government, social studies and related subjects seeking skills and resources to enrich course curriculum pertaining to the U.S. Constitution.
- **Oral History Project** - The Johnson Institute is conducting an oral history project to capture the stories of people who knew and worked with Judge Johnson as well as those who were influenced by his decisions.
- **Courthouse Visitors** - The Johnson Institute regularly hosts tours of the Frank M. Johnson Courthouse in downtown Montgomery, AL.
